PATH Panel Discussion:

Groundbreaking legislation for Kenyan women, newborns, and children in the spotlight at Women Deliver conference

Proposed legislation to save the lives of women, newborns, and children in Kenya will be spotlighted during a high-level panel discussion between Kenyan policymakers and civil society leaders on Thursday, May 19, at the [Women Deliver conference](#) in Copenhagen.

Kenya is a frontrunner in prioritizing maternal, newborn, and child health (MNCH) in its policies and programming. Kenyan leaders have further signaled commitment by developing comprehensive, first-of-its-kind legislation to ensure all women, newborns, and children have equitable access to high-quality MNCH services. Hosted by PATH, the panel will convene policymakers, experts, and advocates to learn from Kenya's experience, discuss strategies for accelerating introduction of the proposed legislation, and identify opportunities for action in Kenya and the region.
